

2020 ICGSA Hall of Fame Inductees

The following 4 individuals were chosen to be enshrined into the ICGSA Hall of Fame, Class of 2020. Each of them was nominated by people within the game of softball and voted on by the ICGSA Softball Committee. Unfortunately, due to the current COVID-19 situations, we will be postponing their induction ceremony until June of 2021. On behalf of the Indiana Coaches of Girls Sports Association – congratulations to these deserving individuals!

Gordon Wood - Tecumseh HS Head Coach

Gordon Wood has spent 17 years in the Softball program at Tecumseh HS. After 4 years as an Assistant Coach, he has been at the helm for the Braves for the past 13 seasons. His accomplishments with the Tecumseh Braves are nothing short of remarkable. Gordon has posted an overall record of 302-98 which includes the following: 4 conference championships, 13 Sectional championships (his Sectional record as a head coach is an astounding 29-0), and 11 Regional championships. On top of that, Gordon has led the Braves to 7 appearances in the IHSAA State Championship, with 3 of those resulting in his teams being State Champions. His teams were IHSAA State Runner-up in 2007, 2008, 2013, and 2019 while being crowned IHSAA State Champions in 2009, 2011, and 2017. Twice he has been named the District 5 Coach of the Year and has helped coach in the North/South All-Star Game. Gordon is a well-respected coach around the entire state of Indiana and is well deserving of this high honor.

Scot Shearer - ICGSA Committee Member

Scot Shearer has worked in the game of softball in some capacity for 33 years. He has been a coach for the following high schools: Concord, Northwood, Goshen, and LaVille. At Concord HS, Scot led the Minutemen to back to back conference championships, and is the all-time winningest coach in LaVille HS's history. Scot was also named the 2013 District 2 Coach of the Year and helped coach in the North/South All-Star Game. His contributions to the game of softball go far beyond his coaching; Scot has been a part of the ICGSA for over 30 years. He has been awarded both the 20-year and 30-year awards from the ICGSA as well as being named the 2005 ICGSA Service Award winner. While on the ICGSA Softball Committee Scot has served as the District 2 representative 4 times, the North/South All-Star Game coordinator, the ICGSA Softball Coaches Poll coordinator, and most importantly the ICGSA Softball Chairperson. Scot's contributions to the game of softball cannot be measured, and as such he is well deserving of this honor.

Audrey Bickel - Andrean HS Player

Audrey Bickel had one of the most successful playing careers in the state's history. During her time as a player for the Andrean 59ers, Audrey led the team to an overall record of 100-27, including a remarkable 18-2 record in the IHSAA State Tournament. Audrey was a part of 2 State Championship teams, in 2007 and 2010. In her 4 years Audrey compiled the following statistics: a batting average of .474, 172 hits, 30 home runs, and 145 runs batted in. She is in the top-10 in the state record book for multiple categories. Her recognitions are also noteworthy. Audrey was named 2nd Team All-State in 2008 and 1st Team All-State in both 2009 and 2010. During her senior season she was selected to participate in the North/South All-Star Game, and in 2019 Audrey was elected into the Andrean HS Athletic Hall of Fame. After high school, Audrey went on to have 4 very successful years at Ball State University – including being awarded the Mid-American Conference Medal of Excellence during her senior campaign. As one of the top players in the state's history, Audrey is extremely deserving of this honor.

Crystal (Inman) Dombrowski - Shenandoah HS Player

Crystal Inman has been a part of the game of softball at almost every level possible – high school, travel, college, and Olympic. Her contributions at each are different, but one thing remained constant – success. As a pitcher/player for Shenandoah HS, Crystal was named 1st Team All-State in 1994, 1995, and 1996. She helped lead the Raiders to an IHSAA State Runner-up in 1995, and in 1996 was named Indiana's Miss Softball as well as a Fastpitch World HS All-American. She finished her high school career with a pitching record of 59-11, and ERA of 0.60, and just under 800 strikeouts. She also contributed at the plate with a career batting average of .462 and 71 runs batted in. After high school Crystal went on to play 4 years collegiately at Purdue University and then began her coaching career, where she coached at both the high school and college levels. She also did some coaching and administrative work with USA Softball. Crystal has given so much to softball and is extremely deserving of this honor.
